Limited Code Blue OR: Improving Intraoperative Resuscitation Tara McCray, BSN, RN, CNOR & Renee Wong, RN, CPAN St. Joseph Medical Center, Tacoma, WA

Objective & Background

Gaps in care delivery and standard protocols resulted in chaotic intraoperative resuscitation events, undesired outcomes, and staff distress. A critical need for change was recognized and an interdisciplinary team was formed with the goal of improving intraoperative resuscitation.

Implementation

Resuscitation Support

- Collaborative interdisciplinary response initiated by standardized call for "Limited Code Blue, OR _____"
- Activation of experienced Code RN, pharmacist, and additional anesthesiologist

Structured Education & Training

- Hands-on annual ORspecific mock code
- Tiered inclusion of ACLS training, prioritizing Charge RNs and Resource RNs
- Role delineation
- Code debrief emphasis

Conclusion

A focus on improving outcomes for our patients resulted in a culture shift from self-sufficiency to a collaborative intraoperative resuscitation approach. With the implementation of the Limited Code Blue OR initiative, OR traffic was limited, but still allowed for crucial support from an experienced Code RN, pharmacist, and an additional anesthesiologist. The initiation of the Limited Code Blue OR and continued education has provided the specialized support, skills, and knowledge necessary to make an impact on improving our resuscitation response.

Method

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Medications not delivered in a timely manner

Many team members lacked BLS and/or ACLS proficiency

Availability of PACU RNs to respond to intraoperative codes not guaranteed

Hesitation to activate preexisting "Code Blue" response

Culture of perioperative selfsufficiency

Concerns regarding increased OR traffic and unnecessary contamination

Future Work & Acknowledgements

The Limited Code Blue OR initiative is still in its infancy stage, but continues to gain momentum. 5 Limited Code Blue OR responses were called in 2021. Over the next year, we will collect data and continue to reinforce staff education with hands-on training and code debriefs.
